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SKILLS TRAINING & FORMAL EDUCATION

During the quarter we enrolled 33 students, that is, (16 students (M-3; F-13) in the Tailoring and Dressmaking and (17 students (M-9; F-8) in the Catering and Housekeeping class

On Thursday, September 21, 2023, the students had the opportunity to visit the Logos Hope ship. The aim of the field trip was to provide insight on transport catering and housekeeping.

Below is a summary of all resident, reunified and community children supported to access skills training and formal education during the quarter.

RESCUE EFFORTS

The Centre admitted **29** (**10** girls and **19** boys) vulnerable children, who were referred to us by the Police and the County Children's Office. Most of them were found begging including a six year old girl who was found lost and another rescued from early marriage.

We directly reunified **5 minors**, **that is**, **4 boys and 1 girl** with their families as seen in the photos below and supported the reunification of 13 minors (9 boys and 4 girls) through the Tononoka Children's Court.



REUNIFICATION SNAPSHOT

The social work team, without viable contacts for the minors parents travelled to Kyumbi and successfully traced the school the children attended before running away to Mombasa. The teachers at the school identified the boys, and alerted their parents/caregivers who were relieved that they had been found safe.

The minor pictured ran away from Ihindu Naivasha to Mombasa. He was referred to the Centre by Makupa Police Station. Following guidance and counseling sessions, he stated that he preferred a skills training course rather than formal education. Upon reunification, the Wema social worker shared this with the boys Mother and uncle, which prompted the uncle to offer to take the boy in and support him to pursue a mechanics course. The team travelled from Naivasha to Kabete where the boys was reunified to his uncle and aunt.



PSYCHOSOCIAL SUPPORT

Psychosocial support is one of the most powerful ways of empowering street connected children. It is an effective tool for rehabilitation and personal development.

Sports

The boys and girls under 16 football teams train three times a week on Monday, Thursday and Saturday. The girls team participated in the Mombasa Football extravaganza hosted by Glad's House Kenya in August. Although they did not make it to the finals, they were awarded full uniform and a football by former Royal Air force UK coach John Mcglasson. The coach also supported the team with a training sessions at Wema Centre.

On 3rd September, the boys team went to SOS villages for a friendly match and drew 1-1. In attendance was Mr. Mike Hilbig, Head of Talents & Scouting UEFA A-license Coach who was very impressed with, Brian Juma, one of our players.

Music

The Wema Brass Band continues to practice and has learnt knew melodies, that is, (Mary Atieno-Adamu na Eva). The band happily kicks off events at the Centre with the National Anthem, among other regular activities.

The Wema choir continues to practice every Sunday together with our contemporary and traditional dance troupe.

THE WEMA FARM

The Wema Farm which is supported by Farm of Soul, harvested cabbages and tomatoes from the Greenhouse and also planted capsicum and a new batch of tomatoes. The produce goes towards the kitchen food requirements.

Additionally, we harvested plenty of Mchicha which was also utilized in the Wema nutrition program.



While we have embraced new methods of farming such as hydroponic and green house farming, we also saw a good harvest from traditional Farming. The open field now has diversified crops, which include:

- Spinach
- Kales
- Carrots
- Onions
- Spider plant
- •Black Nightshade
- Okra
- Eggplant
- Pumpkin
- Cucumber
- Bananas
- Sweet potatoes

The above produce goes towards feeding the children. So far, all produce is going to the kitchen and we hope to have surplus to sell in the future.
